Biden Administration has an elevated focus on advancing racial equity and supports for underserved and adversely impacted communities through the federal government.

Includes people of color, people who identify as LGBTQ+, people of religious minorities, children and families living with persistent poverty, and other individuals who have been historically underserved, marginalized and otherwise not provided fair, just, and impartial treatment.



Important to address systemic bias and racism so that individuals are not left behind from achieving education, health care, jobs, safe neighborhoods and housing, and financial security.

Exposing inequities has highlighted the costs of racism.



Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs) linked to chronic health problems and mental illness

US HHS, CDC, Preventing Adverse Childhood Experiences 2021 Children of color are more likely to experience ACEs

ACF-IM-IOAS-22-01 (Sacks and Murphey 2018)

Link between racial inequity, social determinants of health, and health outcomes

ACF has an ambitious agenda to eliminate inequities within federal programming

Children's Bureau is addressing racial equity, diversity, and inclusion in all program areas



CFSR is one avenue to advance goals of diversity, racial equity, and inclusion as we ensure state compliance with titles IV-B and IV-E

Recent released letter and foundational guidelines to lay out vision for CFSR process to examine racial equity and inclusion







Important to apply a racial equity and inclusion lens in the CFSR at all stages



Essential to assess, identify, address system and practice improvement



Consider potential evidence of disparities that contribute to inequities



Open and honest dialogue to understand causes of racial inequities





Diversity

Engage diverse individuals with lived experience



Represent Community

Make certain that others involved in CFSR process represent diversity of those in community and system



Problem-Solving

Ensure people most affected by the problems are engaged in PIP development and monitoring




